CUTS TO GRASS CUTTING

It can't have escaped anyone's notice that NKDC along with many councils around the country are having to pull in the purse strings, and one aspect of public services to be affected is grass cutting. Many house-holders in Swaton have always kept the grass areas in front of their houses adjascent to the road mowed, and in 2017 this will be no less vital to keeping our village neat and tidy. If you do have a grassy area in front of your property and don't usually mow it, then please stretch a little



further out from your own front garden! If you don't have the ability or equipment to do that then ask a neighbour or friend. It's going to be the only way to stop a meadow growing right outside your house !



UPDATE - QUEEN ELIZABETH PARK

Back in November the Zipwire, Swing and Seesaw were installed in the park thanks to various donations and an £8,000 grant from Tesco bags of Help. The good news is The Lottery's 'Awards for All' has just granted Swaton's Park £9,998.00. Grant provider usually stipulate what they would like their money to buy & the Lottery has chosen to purchase the wheelchair friendly roundabout and any

remaining money is to go towards a basket Swing or the cradle and inclusive swing set. Other recent awards have included £500 from Lincolnshire Playing Fields Association, £250 from Lincolnshire Rural Housing Association & £1,740 from Bicker Windfarm Trust. Bicker wants to fund the materials for the Park's bespoke Shelter, which is going to be crafted by a few skilled volunteers within the village saving many thousands of pounds not having to purchase one from a commerical company.

Over the next few months you should see the roundabout installed and hopefully one or two additional items and the shelter should be completed in July. A path is going to be installed that leads to the Roundabout – volunteers will be needed to help dig it out – if you're willing to be part of that group please contact Alan Wilson 01529 421334 – we need volunteers to make this happen. Other grants have been applied for or are in the middle of being written so fingers crossed we are fortunate enough to win those too – every penny really does count but many funders make it a long, drawn out process.

Many thanks to Charles who has been cutting the grass in the park – your efforts are sincerely appreciated. If anyone else is able to help maintain the park then please contact Alan. It's a village facility that we will have to tend to ourselves so any help is appreciated.

District Council Report from Cllr Mrs Kate Cook

Unitary authority

You may have seen an announcement in the local media and on social media from Lincolnshire County Council Leader Martin Hill about plans to ask County Councillors to vote on whether a referendum should be held asking if Lincolnshire should switch to a unitary system of governance.

If approved, it will take place at the same time as the County



Council elections in May. This is a statement in response to the announcement from Councillor Mrs Marion Brighton OBE: "*I am not at all surprised to learn of Cllr Hill's intentions following on from his abandonment of the Devolution proposals for Greater Lincolnshire late last year. North Kesteven District Council remains committed to a model of devolution as the best opportunity for achieving sustainable growth and excellent public services in*

Lincolnshire, with the considerable additional funds that would generate for Lincolnshire which cannot be facilitated by a unitary model. As an individual authority, we have a strong vision, an excellent plan built on widespread support by partners and public, and a viable financial plan which we will continue to pursue that in the interests of our residents and we will continue to encourage a partnership approach to any proposals for change, based on dialogue and robust, substantiated information."

Garden waste goes live



Applications open on Wednesday, February 1 for new and re-newed subscription to NKDC's garden waste service for the 12 months from April 2017. The price has been frozen for the lowcost, hassle-free service to have your brown bin emptied throughout the year. Collection costs are £30 for one garden waste bin and £12 for each additional bin – and for the first time anyone renewing their subscription can opt to pay by direct debit alongside other methods of payment. Subscription opens online 1^{st} February & by phone from 1^{st} March.

Riverside Centre

Work has started on the first phase of the £500,000 revamp of the Riverside Centre in Sleaford. A team from local contractors Maher Millard is on site undertaking work including opening up the central courtyard, removing the bandstand and display units

and some of the colonnades fronting shops along the Southern side of the development. Dated cladding along the shops on the southern side of the centre will also be removed and the ground and upper floor levels will be revamped. It is hoped this work will be complete by early July.



Spokesperson for Lincolnshire Co-op Emma Snedden said: "We're pleased to have started work on this project, which will see significant investment in the Riverside Centre

for the benefit of people in Sleaford, making it a much-improved shopping environment. The businesses in the centre are open during the works so we'd encourage shoppers to carry on supporting them while it takes place."

SWATON PARISH COUNCIL

MEETING - 17th JANUARY 2017

Speed Indicator Signs: Speed indicator signs held by Swaton parish council will have new batteries. Swaton plus three other neighbouring councils have made equal contributions and will share the use of these devices.

Play Area: Three items of play equipment are now in place in the newly created Swaton play park. An area of land off the High Street has been leased by the Crown Estates and to date donations and grant funding provided the funds for the three items. A zip wire, a see saw and two flat swings plus the necessary surfacing have been installed. Further grants are being investigated and applied for to fund more equipment and a MUGA (multi-use games area).

Lighting: A request for an additional footway light in Swaton has been made to NKDC and a site inspection is to be arranged.

Grass Cutting: There will be <u>no</u> County Council verge grass cutting in Swaton this year. Parishioners are reminded that as the previous funding has been withdrawn the Parish Council does not have the funds to organise the cutting on behalf of the County Council

2017/18 Budget: Swaton parishioners will have a small drop in their council tax contribution to the Parish Council. It was agreed to keep the precept for 2017/18 at $\pounds 2,500.00$ – the same as the current year. As there has been a small increase in the parish tax base, this will mean a small reduction for Swaton residents.

Planning: Parish councillors had no objections to a proposed plan for a two-storey side and rear extension at 2 Cardyke Cottage, Parson's Grove.

SAVING LIVES IN LINCOLNSHIRE

LIVES (Lincolnshire Integrated Voluntary Emergency Service)

Swaton has had an active responder group in the village for past 3+ years but the numbers of qualified responders within the group have dwindled. For anyone new to the region that doesn't know what LIVES does – it is an invaluable back up to the Ambulance Service, called out to attend medical emergencies within a 6-mile radius from their base point (ours being Swaton) when an ambulance is too far away to cover a serious medical issue such as breathing difficulties, cardiac arrest etc. All LIVES operatives are volunteers and give a little of their free time to be on duty, fitting it in around work and family life. All responders are given full training to confidently and knowledgeably attend a call & carry oxygen and a defib as well as other first aid related items.

LIVES is a very worthy cause and you don't have to have any previous medical experience to be part of this function.
