SUPERFAST BROADBAND

We all rejoiced at the news that Swaton was to get Superfast broadband, we sat and listened to the rhetoric of Stephen Brooks (Lincolnshire Programme Manager) on how we would <u>all</u> benefit and relished the opportunity to work from home, download a TV programme which didn't take days, conduct speedy research for homework, do a quick online shop or actually see an email the same day it was sent to us but alas, for some that isn't the case. Having signed up for superfast with my current supplier I didn't see any improvement, in fact



at times it seemed worse so I contacted Sky who tested the lines, confirmed it was indeed slow and sent out engineers. Despite being told "problem solved" our service was still extremely slow to non-existent ! Anyway, to cut a very long story short it hadn't been upgraded, after the 4th BT Openreach engineer's visit she explained that we aren't connected to Cabinet 3 (the new one near the telephone box). We are in fact still connected to Cabinet 2 in Helpringham over 3km away. So, that started me thinking, if I'm not connected could there be others? After some research, I found an Openreach web page that tells you (either by postcode or by phone number) how a house is connected . . . so I checked it out and it looked like there were at least 12 properties in Swaton connected to Cabinet 2 that can't get superfast due to the fact there is a gap in the cabling roughly between my house and the north end of the village.

I also followed-up my research by speaking to most of the excluded households. I have since been in contact with our District Councillor as well as Stephen Brooks by email and more recently face to face. Stephen Brooks said he is going to elevate this issue up but an earlier email reply to me was very clear . . . *He had spoken to BT & they confirmed my address, along with the others are fed from Cabinet 2 as the BT DSL Checker shows but quite why it shows FTTC speeds as being available is a mystery and BT are sorting out their data. The engineer that attended is correct in her assessment that the only way for us to get better broadband is to be connected to the new Cabinet 3, but it isn't as simple as that. BT has what is called an 'Equivalence' agreement with all Internet Service Providers that use their infrastructure and under that agreement, they are not able to divert individual numbers to a new cabinet. This is regulated by Ofcom, so they will <u>not</u> carry out the work.*

<u>So what is the next step?</u> I've been advised to put sufficient pressure on to my supplier and others affected should do likewise – get <u>your</u> ISPs to investigate and they'll raise an order for the work with BT openreach. You must complain and keep on complaining. In the meantime, I am going to pursue various avenues to try to get to the bottom of this scenario some of us find ourselves in but think we are unfortunately some way off any resolution. DIGITAL HUBS

A joint initiative between West Lindsey, City of Lincoln and North Kesteven councils is under way to help people to get online or improve their digital skills at community level by setting up 'Digital Hubs'.

This initiative is aimed at people within communities who need to be on-line but don't have regular or personal access to a computer or smart phone. There are many reasons we need to be on line but for some this may be a vital link.



One of the reasons behind this digital initiative is

the changes happening in the Benefits System - the changes are to simplify the system by merging a string of working-age benefits and tax credits into one single payment, called 'Universal Credit' and this will be <u>totally on-line</u> so anyone claiming benefits will need to be computer literate and have access to the internet to make a claim.

Anyone looking for a job needs to be able to access the internet – job centres don't have rows of boards with job cards on display anymore, so unless a job seeker can get in to their local job centre or library to access a PC the digital hub could be a vital resource for them too.

Digital Hubs are in their infancy in our region, some areas of the country are up and running and lessons are being learned from those. It isn't clear how or where these will be set up, whether they will be regionally based somewhere within the Osbournby Ward or ideally one in each village. Although there may be some renovated PCs to be had there is <u>no</u> Government funding being given for these projects so this isn't something that's going to happen overnight.

Local and Parish Councils across the country will be assessing what the needs are within their communities and how this unfunded project can come to fruition, especially in remote villages and isolated regions.

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Police Commissioner and EU Referendum Vote

Voting for Lincolnshire's Police Commissioner takes place on **Thursday May 5th** – the Polling Station will be open from 7am for you to cast your vote and closes at 10pm.

The Polling station will be open again on June 23rd for the EU Referendum.

If you haven't already registered to vote – maybe it's your first time voting and you'll be 18 by the 23rd June or you've recently moved in to the region then you must register to vote by June 7th if you want a say in the EU referendum.

The register simply go on-line and type in <u>https://www.gov.uk/register-to-vote</u>

When you register, you'll be asked for your personal details including NI number – it is very simple to do. After you have completed the on-line pages your application will be sent to NKDC.



If you don't have access to a computer then ask a friend or neighbour – it only takes 2 mins and sure someone in the village will be happy to help you.

JOBS TO DO IN YOUR 'MAY' GARDEN

Top tips: After all risk of frost has passed this month, plant out tomatoes, courgettes and pumpkins that were previously sown under cover. Other young plants can be planted out once conditions are suitable, and once they've been hardened off.

Sowing and planting - Fruit:

- Plant out alpine strawberry seedlings sown in early spring. •
- Sow outdoor melons in a heated propagator. •

Sowing and planting - Vegetables:

- Sow French beans, runner beans, squash, cucumbers and pumpkin seeds • directly into prepared beds outside. Be alert to late frosts (for which a covering of horticultural fleece should provide sufficient protection).
- Sow sweet corn outside in blocks, at least 45cm (18in) spacing, with two seeds • per hole. The strongest seedling can be selected later.
- Sow cauliflowers and purple sprouting broccoli for harvesting next winter.
- Try sowing some unusual vegetables such as kohl rabi (like a large white aboveground turnip), scorzonera and salsify.
- Witloof chicory can be sown this month, to have some ready for forcing next • winter. Sow in drills directly outside.
- After all risk of frost has passed, plant out tomatoes, courgettes and pumpkins that were previously sown under cover.
- Other young plants can be planted out once conditions are suitable, and once • they've been hardened off (acclimatised to the colder outdoor conditions) for 10 to 14 days.
- Brussels sprouts for next winter should now be ready for transplanting after ٠ early or mid-spring sowing.
- Plant out artichokes that were previously sown under cover. ٠
- Self-blanching celery can also be planted out towards the end of the month. ٠
- Ridge cucumbers can be sown indoors now, for planting out in early June. ٠

Pruning and training - Fruit:

- Remove wayward shoots on fan-trained trees and tie in better placed ones. ٠
- Thin out crowded raspberry shoots. ٠
- Thin gooseberries if you want large fruit. •
- Tie in leading and side shoots of kiwifruit. •

Problems

- Keep an eve out for asparagus beetles, and pick them off by hand. ٠
- Watch for small holes the flea beetles make on brassica seedlings. •
- Water plants well to help them continue growing despite the pest damage. ٠
- Protect carrots with insect-proof mesh to prevent carrot root fly.
- Slugs pose a threat, and slug controls are necessary now, as always. ٠
- Protect brassicas and peas from pigeons.
- Pick yellowing leaves off brassicas promptly, to prevent spread of grey mould • and brassica downy mildew.
- With apple sawfly and capsid bug and prevent blossom wilt if it struck last year. ٠
- Put up codling moth traps in apple trees. •
- Look out for spur blight, cane spot and cane blight on raspberries, blackberries ٠ and hybrid berries.
- Put bird protection in place for all soft fruit. ٠
- Deal with raspberry leaf and bud mite and raspberry rust from now on.
- Keep on top of weed control and continue through to summer. •

IN THE 'MAY' GARDEN (cont.)

GENERAL CARE

Fruit :

- Pull off suckers appearing around the base of fruit trees. ٠
- Liquid feed fruit trees growing in pots with a balanced feed every fortnight.
- De-blossom strawberry runners planted since September. •
- Water blueberries, cranberries and lingonberries when needed with rainwater, but use tap water when butts are empty.
- Take softwood cuttings of kiwifruit. •
- Remove any winter protection from figs and carry out pruning. •
- Move growing-bags into the greenhouse to warm up two weeks before planting indoor melons, and water well two days before planting.
- ٠ Gently run your hand over indoor grape vine flowers to pollinate them.
- Make sure fruit isn't drought stressed, especially those in containers, against a wall • or newly planted.
- Make sure bees can access caged and cloched fruit flowers to ensure pollination. ٠
- Keep a check on late frost forecasts and protect blossom as necessary. •

Vegetables :

- Earth up potatoes when the shoots are 23cm (9in) high, in order to prevent the new ٠ tubers going green. Earthing-up is the drawing up of soil around the stems of the plants, leaving just 5cm (2in) of shoot uncovered so that the plant has enough foliage to continue growing.
- Start to remove side shoots from cordon tomatoes as you see them. The side shoots develop in the leaf axils (i.e. between the stem and leaf), and if allowed to develop will sap the energy of the plant and reduce the quality of the yield.
- Strings stretched along the tops of broad bean plants can support them, and prevent ٠ them flopping once pods develop.
- Peas need staking with pea sticks, netting, or pruned twigs from the garden. •

RECREATION PARK

The plans for the park are coming along nicely and grants will be applied for once the quotation stage has been finalised – unfortunately dealing with quite a few playground companies has made it a lengthy process. Due to the consultation process, the initial plans were slightly amended with additional pieces of equipment added in or



some changed so we are awaiting updated quotes.

The electric cables that ran along the park have now been relocated as they would have prohibited the installation of the Zip Wire and Tennis Court. Now it's a case of dealing with the neighbouring trees to the right of the park which have to be pruned back and made safe so we are currently awaiting news from the landowner on what is happening with those.

We appreciate the process appears to be taking its time but be assured the park is moving forward.

A MESSAGE FROM CHRIS HARRINGTON - OUR REV
